One of the most difficult transitions for leaders to make is the shift from doing to leading. As a new manager you can get away with holding on to work. 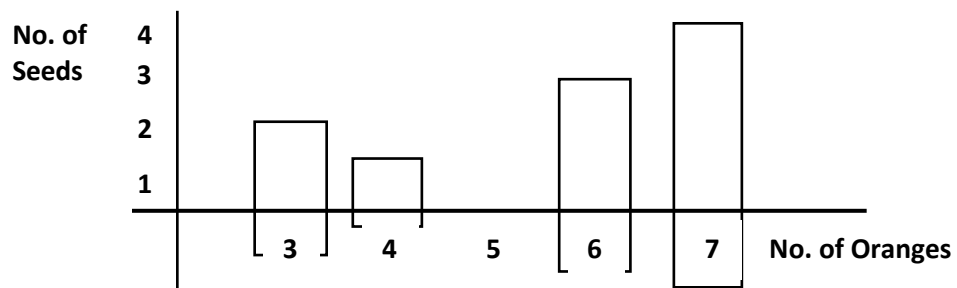
